United Nations Mission in South Sudan (UNMISS)

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<u>In news</u>—Recently, around 1,160 Indian peacekeepers serving with the UNMISS were awarded UN medals, honouring them for their exceptional service in the strife-torn East African country.

About the United Nations Mission in South Sudan(UNMISS)-

- The UNMISS was initially **established for a period of one year from 9 July 2011**, under Security Council **Resolution 1996** (2011), with the intent to renew for further periods as needed.
- Since then, UNMISS has been renewed consistently with the Security Council determining that the situation in South Sudan continues to pose a threat to international peace and security in the region.
- Currently, under Resolution 2625 (2022), the Council has
 extended the UNMISS mandate until 15 March 2023.
- Almost 20,000 peacekeepers serve with the UNMISS to protect civilians and build durable peace in the conflict-affected country.
- The civilian, police and military personnel from 73 countries carry out many duties under the mandate provided by the United Nations Security Council.

• Their work falls under the following four main pillars:

- 1. Protection of Civilians.
- 2. Creating conditions conducive to the delivery of humanitarian assistance.
- 3. Supporting the implementation of the revitalized agreement and the peace process.
- 4. Monitoring and investigating human rights.
- India is one of the largest troop-contributing countries

to UN peacekeeping missions. Currently, 2,385 Indian military personnel, the second-highest.

What is Peacekeeping by the United Nations?

- Peacekeeping by the United Nations is a role held by the Department of Peace Operations as an "instrument developed by the organization as a way to help countries torn by conflict to create the conditions for lasting peace".
- It is distinguished from peacebuilding, peacemaking, and peace enforcement although the United Nations does acknowledge that all activities are "mutually reinforcing" and that overlap between them is frequent in practice.
- Peacekeepers monitor and observe peace processes in post-conflict areas and assist ex-combatants in implementing the peace agreements they may have signed.
- Such assistance comes in many forms, including confidence-building measures, power-sharing arrangements, electoral support, strengthening the rule of law, and economic and social development.
- Accordingly, UN peacekeepers (often referred to as Blue Berets or Blue Helmets because of their light blue berets or helmets) can include soldiers, police officers, and civilian personnel.
- The United Nations Charter gives the United Nations Security Council the power and responsibility to take collective action to maintain international peace and security.
- For this reason, the international community usually looks to the Security Council to authorize peacekeeping operations through Chapter VII authorizations
